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HoshiCandy and Puvithel are two menhera artists and designers in the UK and USA. They run a Facebook group with other moderators to share updates and discusson on menhera to keep the community informed. Together, they have helped us go in depth to clear up misunderstandings of menhera fashion and the impact of its community. They have both written their own articles on menhera as well! Matcha is a recurring segment that focuses on hot topics and controversies within the j-fashion community. Instead of dishing out the news and starting drama, we aim to create a safe space for people to discuss and develop their own opinions. Each issue, we sit down with a voice in the community and ask "what's the tea?" for the topic at hand.

### Menhera

We've all seen those really cute designs while scrolling through different facebook groups, our tumblr (RIP 2007-2018) dashboards. You know the ones we're talking about. They have cute girls in the typical kawaii fashion we're used to: cute pastel colors, big anime eyes, looking like a magical girl, except there's one big glaring differece. The caption underneath will say "I want to die", the girls will brandish bloody knives in acts clearly depicting self harm.

Some people are really offput by theses pieces of art and demand this cease. There's a lot of controversy surrounding the subject of menhera, what it is, what it's for and if it does any good for our community image wise and within.

We've been lucky enough to sit down with two people who are very active advocating for the menhera community, Puvithel and Hoshi, in order to help shed light on some questions, clear up misconceptions, and tell us all about how this can help a lot of members of the kawaii community.

### How did you first find out about menhera?

## Puvi: "I found it two or so years ago through misinformation."

Puvi continued to tell us how her initial idea of the style was very off. Someone told her it was decora with darker colors. From there, she researched it and met many of the people we know in the community today like Hoshi and CherryCheezy.

Hoshi told us she discovered it in 2016, "I was mutuals on Tumblr with the person who created the fyeahmenhera Tumblr and the

menhera Discord...It was really good timing, I had just started therapy and I really needed something to make me feel less

ashamed of everything that was going on in my life.

#### So is it "menhera" or "menhera kei"?

#### Hoshi: "Please don't use 'kei"

Hoshi gave us a tiny Japanese lessing, telling us that the word 'kei' only refers to a fashion style in very specific situations. "In other contexts, it means 'genre', 'type', 'person', in a kind of derogatory sense." Using the term "menhera kei" would be more like saying "those mentally ill people". We want to thank fyeahmenhera for giving us that original translation. "I would translate it as 'psycho'," Hoshi continued, "so it's got a really negative, derogative meaning behind it. So in this case, the case of menhera, please don't use 'kei'."

"It is important to note that menhera by itself, without the kei attached to it, was created by the menhera community for the menhera community." Puvi added. The general public in Japan have a difficult time talking about mental health in a positive light, so the word "menhera" was created to combat that.

## What can you tell us about Ezaki Bisuko and his effects on the menhera community?

Puvi: "He was suddenly put on this pedestal as the spokesperson for menhera to the West."

> Refinery29 did a video focusing on Ezaki Bisuko and a few other menhera icons from Japan. This caused a lot of westerners, especial-

ly those from the US, to learn about menhera. "It was only meant to be a very light look into the scene and at people....However, since it was a light overview, people did not necessarily get the details out of the video and looked to the icons in the video to provide the details." Puvi responded, "That said, a lot of eyes were on Ezaki Bisuko and his work. Menhera-chan."

"He [was] suddenly put on this pedestal as the spokesperson for menhera to the West.... Unfortunately, he keeps saying things that are wrong." Puvi elaborated. She then told us about how there was a lot of confusion in the community over the name of the style because Ezaki Bisuko said menhera was bad word. It took a while to get everyone back on the

same page afterward.

Ezaki Bisuko often collaborates with brands such as ACDC Rag, Listen Flavor, and other brands that are easily accessible to those in the US.

Callie expressed some discomfort with the collaborations, mentioning how it seems less like clothing intended for menhera fashion and is more like Menhera-chan merchandise. Though it can be used in menhera, it tends to lend better to decora and other colorful styles.

## "Menhera-chan clothing is not menhera."

"It's good that you bring that up," Hoshi responded, "because some Menhera-chan clothing is definitely not menhera. Some of it is just very cutesy and doesn't have any kind of menhera imagery at all."

Menhera-chan's cute design and popular manga made a lot of people want merchendist of the charecter. While it helped grow the menhera fashion scene, that wasn't it's intension. Hoshi told us how she is starting to see videos of interviews with Japanese models or Japanese people wearing Menhera-chan clothing. "When asked 'what is menhera?' they give the derogative answer. 'Oh,' they say, 'Oh, I'm dressed as a menhera. That's a person that is obsessive and crazy.""

Overall, Puvi and Hoshi agreed that he does more good than harm for community by bringing more awareness and allowing people in the community a platform to talk about menhera. He spreads awareness, but not accuracy. Despite the misinformation it seems many who are interested want to join when accurate information is given.

However, he has copy written words such as "yamikawaii" and other ones relating to the fashion. After his first controversy of making a clear plastic bracelet that depicts self harm marks, the menhera community is pushing him away.

"The menhera community was like, 'excuse me, what is this?" Hoshi told us, "You know, it's not about that kind of costumification of serious things like self harm. So he's definitely put a target on his head as far as the Japanese community is concerned." Despite his large influence in Japan, many in the menhera community would not consider him the face of the menhera community in Japan. When asked both Puvi and Hoshi agreed Kuua Oyasumi is one of the largest influences in the menhera community in Japan.

Kuua, despite being very large in the fashion, does not like telling others how to style the fashion. "That's common amongst Japanese people generally," Hoshi explained. "They generally want to avoid being the face of things...All we can do is point to models and artists who helped start the trend, like Kuua. Also brands like Nematai and Konpeito and websites like menhera.jp. There's not really a face in Japan."

# "The community came together and built it together."

"And that's kind of one of the things that's so great about menhera." Puvi added, "The community came together and built it together. There is no single person who started it. It evolved naturally with the people."

Puvi, however, was able to recommend a resource for those looking into menhera, menhera.jp. It's more articles based on the community, although there are a few articles on the fashion. Hoshi told us about a particularly memorable article about a girl who was a bit of a shut-in but wore lolita for her own pleasure and its affects on her mental health. "That's a lot closer to what menhera is actually about than a magical girl parody manga."

Puvi was also able to give us another manga called Menhera Shoujo Kurumi-chan by

Kit asked about self-harm photos in the menhera tags on social media, to which Hoshi replied "It's difficult, but one of the responsibilities for some of the healthier and stronger members of the menhera community is to try and reach out to those people because obviously those people are severely in need of help" She elaborated, saying "the moment someone starts doing those things and kind of being proud of it and showing it off in that way, that to me is somebody who is severely in need of an interven-

tion." Though showing off self harm is a thing that happens, those people do not represent the spirit of the menhera community.

Does menhera in any way glorify self harm?

Puvi: "It is always about acknowledging those coping mechanisms, good and bad."

"Menhera is not here to candy coat and sugarcoat the world and tell you that everything is always great and everyone is happy and doing well," Puvi continued. The then went on to tell us how menhera is about acknowledging the bad so that we can learn to strive for better. Menhera exists to be vent art, some of which tends to be graphic. The western menhera movement tends to shy away from the darker connotations of menhera, often refusing to look at the bad. "Menhera can be very positive in its message." She added, "It can also just be saying, look, this exists and we should talk about it. We need to deal with it." It never says that

you should use poor coping mechanisms.

Hoshi made a poignant point, asking "Do

## What are some of the key differences between menhera in Japan and in the West?

Puvi: "Menhera fashion came over to the West, but not as much with the rest of the menhera philosophy and community."

Puvithel told us about how the menhera community menhera community is an activism and lifestyle movement. "It is about bettering the mental wellbeing of yourself and those around you." She also noted how cultural differences may be to blame for the over-abundance of medical motifs in the Western community. "We have a lot of problems with how we view mental health and chronic health in the States. We get stuck a lot on medication. I personally and many menhera in the US have had the issue where we avoided taking medication because of the stigma. So for us that is important, the cute pills are an expression to say 'this is not bad," Hoshi mentioned how she thinks medical motifs have ended up being more popular in the West "because they're more safe for work... less confrontational. I think people feel safer wearing depictions of medication than they would a depiction of a kawaii anime girl hanging herself." Puvi then reminded us how the word menhera was created because they didn't even have a word for themselves. Their board was originally the BPD board. "Every single mental and chronic health issue, you were a BPD. That's why they created menhera." Japan is still at a much earlier stage of garnering acceptance for mental health and chronic health.

Hoshi informed the group that "the Japanese term for depression or mental illness is "kokoro no kaze" which means a "a cold for the heart". It's not a true illness, but your heart is just feel-

ing under the weather. "It's kind of like a polite euphemism." She mentioned how if you ask about someone and say that in response, "you don't ask any more questions and that's the end of the conversation."

Hoshi also added that the Japanese menhera community has been around since 2001, making it much older than the Western community. The community and fashion are more seperate in Japan, with strong artist fanbases tying the two together.

### Would you say that the meaning of menhera has been lost or diluted in the West?

Hoshi: "Try creating just a product or a line of products that have menhera depictions that aren't medical so that there's more availability of nonmedical motif stuff.

Both Puvi and Hoshi said that they would like to see more non-medical motifs from the community. Callie asked them how they thought we could bring those motifs back into the fold, to which Hoshi replied "if you're an artist [or] have a brand, try making some prints that are more that kind of style. I mean, even if your brand is very colorful or pastel, those fit just fine. You can just try creating just a product or a line of products that have menhera depictions that aren't medical so that there's more availability of nonmedical motif stuff." She continued, saying "if you're not an artist, then try making some menhera coords that don't just focus around medical motifs and tag them menhera and get them out there. The more of this stuff is that's available and visible, the more it's going to sort of change and rebalance it."

Can other medical and yamikawa styles like nurse kei and glitter gore still be considered menhera? Is there a "wrong way" to do menhera?

Hoshi: "It's like a Venn diagram."

Hoshi described the diagram in detail, saying menhera itself would be a small circle inside yamikawaii. "Yamikawaii includes everything menhera and more... and that can include things that would be considered too costumey or irrelevant to menhera. Nurse kei would be a circle slightly overlapping menhera, but anything that's quite costumey would be in the part that doesn't overlap."

Puvi gave a "no" to glitter gore specifically, saying that "menhera is focused on being accessible, so anything with very heavy styling is not menhera."

Both Puvi and Hoshi agreed that you can express yourself with other fashions if menhera feels too limiting. "They should instead be approaching their fashion with the goal of expressing themselves and then finding out what styles inspire them and what styles they like," Puvi elaborated, "So people don't need to say, 'I want to talk about my mental health with my fashion [so] I have to do menhera. No, you don't have to do menhera. You can talk about these topics in other fashions as well." There's no need to limit yourself. Puvi also added that the only "wrong" way to do menhera is to do things like tagging your self-harm cuts.

Hoshi added that, "If you relate to the menhera community and want to be in the menhera community, but you want to wear styles that don't fit in the box of menhera, absolutely do that." Simply put, you don't need to wear menhera fashion to be part of the menhera community.

## Finally, we asked Puvi and Hoshi for their last remarks for our readers:

Puvi: "Come do the menhera! The menhera groups that I run are open to people who just want to express themselves with fashion as well. Even if they're looking into menhera adjacent styles. Read Hoshi's thing. Menhera is to better your mental health. And you can be menhera without being in menhera fashion. You can be menhera with a single vent art shirt and blue jeans. It's not for everyone, it's not going to handhold everyone, but if you want menhera, there is a menhera for you."

Hoshi: "The menhera community has worked hard with Kei Club on this issue to make sure that there is as much accurate information as possible in this issue. So take this as your starting point. Take this as your Bible, and if you go online like on Instagram and you see stuff tagged menhera that doesn't fit or contradicts with the things that you've read in this issue, this is your opportunity to erase that misinformation. Show people this issue of Kei Club, educate people with the articles in here. You have been given the power to do this now. Whether you're a newbie or a veteran, the best thing that you can do for the menhera community at the moment is to help spread more accurate information.

I didn't have the time or budget to make totally new costumes for each day so instead I decided to create the monster looks inspired by various J-fashion styles using clothing items I already own and only making a few pieces from scratch here and there.

In those 31 days I created some of my favourite ever coords and truly explored the creative possibilities of my wardrobe. There was a lot of experimentation and learning on the go, and today I'd like to share with you all

an in-depth look at my TOP TEN Favourite Monster Girl LEWKS from the challenge:

# #10 Hetsper

Monster Character: Fi the Harpy, a spunky and energetic bird girl.

Style Inspiration: The pastel colors and flowy layers of Fairy Kei with a touch of Gyaru big hair energy.

Favourite Detail: The shimmer of the wings!
Biggest Challenge: Sewing the wings was
very time consuming, I had to cut out
layers and layers of feathers and
some of the materials were
very finicky.

What I'd change: I'm not super satisfied with the make-up for this look, I tried to paint my nose yellow so it could be a beak but it's not super evident, it would be cool to make some sort of beak, maybe out of construction paper or sheet foam.

Monster Character: Medu the Gorgon; DDR master!

Style Inspiration: Decora & Rave fashion.

Favourite Detail: Light-up bats necklace and the tiny snake tongues.

Biggest Challenge: I came across the mesh tubing I used for the snake hair

at a dollar shop and knew right away I wanted to use it but when it came to actually executing the idea, I struggled. Ideally I wanted to make a full mesh-tube wig, but the material is super wiggly and frays extremely easily. My compromise was to make a ton of snakes and coil the extra tubing around my head.

What I'd change: I think this look definitely needs a bunch more accessories and more balancing between the black and neon rainbow colors. I think some black fishnets either over or under the neon thigh-highs would have helped.

What I'd change: Bigger ears, better legs, moar freckles!

Style Inspiration: Wa-lolita.

Favourite Detail: The kitsune print and my kitsune plush turned purse

Biggest Challenge: I really wanted to make a ki-

tsune mask for this but everything I tried turned out terrible. It was also tricky making all those tails and getting them pinned and sewn together, the fur fabric is so so thick! I ended up only making 6 tails because 9 would have been truly

unruly to deal with.

What I'd change: I'm not happy about the make-up, I think it would be much more refined, delicate, and a brighter red would help it stand out more.

Favourite Detail: The photo poses! It was so fun to convey personality solely through body language.



had the sudden desire to give myself and extra set of arms and because I am very bad at telling myself NO, I spent an extra hour of my

day stuffing some long gloves I had with plush stuffing and long pipe cleaners for poseability. At least, in the end it was totally worth it. Also, covering any large amount of your body in one color is tricky and takes practice.

What I'd change: Stronger wires in the arms would be awesome so they can be bent a bit better, pipe cleaners helped but weren't strong enough. Also, a second pair of gloves for my actual arms would help match the skin color better, or maybe investing in some arm socks.

She has won the heart of thousands with anime girls adorned with 80's motifs and depression nap dreamsiness! We had the pleasure of meeting Erin at Magical Girl Day and talked to her about her expiriences with her art and shop "Cherry Pop!"

### What inspires you?

Fashion first and foremost! I love wearing kawaii fashion so I like to stay up to date on the lastest j-fashion styles. It always influences the feelings I have when I am creating a new illustration. Clothing is a form of expression and since it's important to me a lot of times my art is based around a specific sub style of it. My second inspiration is magical girl anime. This genre has always been my favorite so the fashion, characters, themes and artwork has been a huge creative influence for me.

## What influenced you to open an online store?

I met many wonderful people online through the menhera community and they are the reason I am here selling today! They encouraged me to pursue opening an online shop since there was a lack of menhera fashion available for the western audience at the time. I had so many design ideas and was so excited about the prospect of doing something I love! I had always wanted to be a fashion designer and an illustrator so this is my dream job and I'm thankful everyday for those amazing people who encouraged me and helped jumpstart my online shop!

Did you discover menhera before or after you started incorporating more dark/medical themes into your work?

### "I've technically drawn menhera since early high school"

So far we haven't been able to find any official diagnosis to what's going on so I struggle a lot of days feeling nauseous and weak. The store means a lot to me and when I'm so sick that I can't even get up I get pretty hard on myself. When I do have energy and feel good I tend to overwork myself to make up for that lost time. But I'm trying to develop new lifestyles and ways to nurture my body so I can better manage my store.



## What is your favorite thing about running Cherry Pop?

The customers! I have made many friends and had so many delightful experiences meeting and talking with the people who support my work. They always make my day and remind me why I love what I do! I wouldn't be here without them and I'm so grateful everyday.



## What words of advice would you give others coping with illnesses?

Don't beat yourself up. You are valid. No matter what you're going through. You are allowed to give yourself rest when you need it. Don't ever feel bad about giving time to yourself. # spooky onigizi

by Juliann Krute

Traditional Japanese picnics often include handmade onigiri, also known as "rice balls" (although they are rarely in ball shapes). For this basic version, use a metal cookie cutter instead of an onigiri mold or traditional hand-shaping. Japonica rice has a sticky property that enables it to be formed into shapes that will generally hold together so that you can pick them up and eat them with your hands. It is very important to use a short-grained rice suitable for Japanese cooking or sushi. Many of these are actually grown in California now and can be purchased around the world. Treat yourself to "premium" rice and this onigiri will be a simple but delicious snack!





Time: ~5 mins

Servings: 1 per 1/2 cup of rice

#### <u>Ingredients:</u>

Short grain rice (Japanese/sushi rice)

Water

Salt

Nori Sheets

Sliced cheese (optional)

### Supplies:

4 inch ghost-shaped metal cookie cutter

Kitchen scissors



Rinse the rice thoroughly until the water runs clear, then cook according to your preferred method (rice cooker, stove top, InstantPot or donabe/clay pot). Fluff the rice gently after it has cooked and fan to bring it quickly down to body temperature so the rice will stay glossy. Make extra rice in the same batch and use the remainder for the other recipes. You can keep leftovers in the fridge overnight if necessary.

Pack the rice firmly into the cookie cutter mold—it should hold together without being too dense, about 1/2 cup of cooked rice per ghost. It may help to allow the rice to cool completely

within the mold. Unmold by pushing gently with your fingers or the back of a spoon. Add a sprinkle of salt to either side.

Using your kitchen scissors, cut out circles for the eyes and a hollow circle for the mouth. Small bits of sliced cheese can be used to create pupils. Apply these to the top for decoration, before the rice becomes dry. (If the rice dries out too much, just apply a tiny bit of water to the back of the nori sheet and press firmly onto the rice.)



Omurice is a Japanese staple dish of a fried rice in a tomato sauce wrapped in a thin omelette. For this version, nori sheets cut into the shape of a bat are used instead of egg to give more definition and to make it easier to eat.

Time: ~10 mins Servings: 4

#### Ingredients:

1/8th c. diced raw onion 1/4 c. diced ham

1/8th c. canned sliced mushrooms

1/8 c. frozen green peas

1/2 Tbsp. butter

3 T. tomato puree

1 T. tomato ketchup

1 t. tomato paste

1 c. cooked short-grain (Japanese/sushi) rice

1/8th t. salt

Bits of sliced cheese for

eyes

### Supplies:

4 inch long bat-shaped metal cookie cutter

Kitchen scissors Freezer Paper

Pen or pencil Nori sheets



Melt butter in saucepan over medium high heat. Add onions, ham, mushrooms and frozen peas, cook until onions are clear.







Turn heat down to low and add the tomato puree, ketchup, tomato paste and salt. Stir.

Add in the cooked rice and stir thoroughly, making sure to break up any clumps of rice. Turn off heat and allow to cool to a comfortable temperature to handle.





Place the cookie cutter onto freezer paper and trace around the shape with a pen or pencil. Cut out the shape from the freezer paper, then holding a sheet of nori in half, cut out two bat shapes per bat.

On a plate or another piece of freezer paper, place one of the cut out nori bat shapes down, then place the cookie cutter on top. Fill with the rice mixture, packing firmly with your fingers or the back of a spoon. Top with another bat shape of nori. Remove from the cookie cutter by pushing gently down, best to unmold it directly to your serving dish. Add small bits of sliced cheese for eyes.







This pumpkin-spiced dish resembles the taste of a rice pudding, a perfect dessert to end your onigiri meal!

Prep Time: ~10 mins

Servings: 2

#### Ingredients:

1.5 c steamed kabocha or butternut squash

3 t. cream

1 t. pumpkin pie spice 3-4t. (to taste) brown sugar

1t. honey (optional) 3 dates, finely chopped (optional)

1 c. cooked short-grain (Japanese/sushi) rice

### Supplies:

4 inch metal pumpkin cookie cutter (or (Japanese pumpkin), acorn re-use the ghost one for a Pac-Man style ghost)

Nori Sheet

Lettuce or Matcha powder for stem





Mash all but the rice together with a fork. Add in the rice and stir. The mixture will be very sticky.



Pack tightly in the cookie cutter mold, wait until cool, then remove from the mold by gently pressing down with your fingers or the back of a spoon.

Cut out nori shapes with kitchen scissors to resemble a Jack O'Lantern and lay on top. Add lettuce or matcha powder for stem decoration. May not hold up to being picked up — use a spoon for best results! Because of this, you may wish mold and unmold from the cookie cutter directly onto your serving plate.

Menhera fashion has quickly been gaining popularity worldwide! This fast growth has come with it's fair share of misunderstandings about the community and style. Menhera artist and designer HoshiCandy is here with a lesson on menhera's origins, history, and basics. Find more of her work on the pages before and after this article!

### WHAT IS MENHERA?

'Menhera' can be thought of as "a person who seeks mental wellbeing".

The word 'Menhera' was born in Japan in 2001, on the 'Mental Health' board of anonymous forum 2ch, where users discussed their wellbeing. The users of this board were named 'Mental Healthers' which was shortened to 'Menhera'.

The Menhera community covers anything that might cause one mental suffering, such as: physical illness or disability, depression, anxiety, eating disorders, bullying, hyper-sexuality, sexism, homophobia, etc. Importantly, there is not a need for a formal diagnosis, as the focus is on how you feel, and that you want to feel better.

It is difficult to talk about these topics in Japanese society without being heavily stigmatised. Menhera is a community to speak safely without that stigma. Of course, this stigma and need for community when it comes to one's mental wellbeing is not limited only to Japan, and that is why Menhera has grown in the west as well.

Since the creation of the word in 2001, there have been several manga published with 'Menhera' in the title, many Visual Kei songs about it, Menhera idol groups, and several Menhera fashion brands.

However, an unfortunate addition to all this has been the discovery of the word in mainstream media...

Just as the topic of illness is heavily stigmatised in Japanese society, the word 'Menhera' itself became quickly stigmatised and stereotyped as "an attention seeking, troublesome person" or "an overly attached girlfriend" (aka 'yandere'). If you were to speak to a Japanese person about 'Menhera', this would most likely be what they would think you meant. This stereotype tends to be referred to as 'Menhera Kei' in Japanese which is why we avoid the use of 'kei' for Menhera in particular.

Despite all this, the true Menhera community has continued to grow.



# MENHERA MOTIFS

Artists in the Menhera community created many works of 'Vent Art', art that expresses their feelings and suffering. When this art was printed onto clothing, Menhera fashion was born.

These are some themes you will commonly see in Menhera:



Wearing Menhera art printed on clothing serves as a way of literally wearing one's feelings on one's sleeves. It turns invisible suffering visible, and fights against the stigma-driven silence. This means that Menhera fashion is highly confrontational, with graphic depictions of illness symptoms. Although the onlooker may feel discomfort, the Menhera style says "this is my true reality, don't pretend it doesn't exist!"

Depending on the feelings of the wearer, Menhera fashion also says "although I am sick, I can still be 'kawaii'", or "although I appear 'kawaii', on the inside I am suffering".

Turning the invisible visible, forcing the silence to be broken, and challenging kawaii culture, these are the goals of Menhera fashion.

# THE MENHERA SILHOUETTE

Carefully avoiding a highly theatrical or OTT (over-the-top) look is important for maintaining the integrity of the goals of Menhera. Menhera is a very casual style, with few accessories and light makeup. The key is for a coord to centre on Menhera imagery, whether vent art or text-focused designs, printed onto clothing.

Be careful not to dress up as the characters depicted in vent art, who are often costumey, gory and OTT.

### Menhera Coord checklist:

- ☐ Printed Menhera art
- ☐ Byojaku / Minimal makeup
- □ Not OTT / Few accessories
- ☐ Flat shoes
- □ [Optional] Oversized top
- □ [Optional] Hime bangs
- □ [Optional] Twintails



Colours can vary: a pastellyume look, or a gothic yami look, both are fine!



The makeup style is called 'Byojaku' meaning 'sickly/weak'. Reddish colours are applied to areas around the eyes to give the impression of crying or illness. The rest of the face is kept plain without much color.

## A NOTE OF CAUTION

The Menhera community is about healing, and seeking recovery and wellbeing. It advocates getting help, medication, therapy, and receiving support through your recovery journey.

True Menhera never encourages or enables harmful behaviours, and never glorifies them. Menhera fashion is an alternative way of expressing your suffering without self-harm. Menhera fashion empowers the individual through their recovery, but does not empower harmful behaviours.

There are some, sometimes labelled by the community as 'Wannabe Menhera', who mistook the meaning of 'Menhera' after seeing its rise in popularity, as it being trendy to fake mental illness. They engage in behaviours such as posting self-harm photos (real or faked) to social media with the tag #menhera, and other attention-seeking behaviours.

While this is the opposite of what the Menhera community stands for, is harmful to the unfortunate viewers of these photos, and creates further stigma against the community... it cannot be ignored that these 'Wannabe Menhera', too, need help and healing.

The Menhera fashion movement is to help you feel comfortable, unashamed, and kawaii in your skin, scars and all. It is NOT for encouraging people to create new scars "for the aesthetic".

If you are struggling with mental or physical suffering, thoughts or behaviours that cause harm to yourself or others, please seek help. If you do not believe you deserve help, you do, please seek help.

If you believe you are faking it, you likely are not, your feelings are valid, please seek help.

## ALTERNATIVES TO MENHERA

After reading all this you may be thinking "the Menhera community sounds good but the fashion is too restrictive for me" and if so, you're not alone! But the good news is that you don't have to wear Menhera fashion to be in the Menhera community.

Look up any of these alternative styles online for examples and more information:

Yamikawaii ('Sickly-cute') essentially the aesthetic of Menhera without the activism, a corrupted dark kawaii. Unfortunately the word was trademarked and now suffers from copyright takedowns.

Yumekawaii ('Dreamy-cute') an aesthetic evolved from Fairy Kei to describe everything pastel and kawaii, but with a slight edge, described as 'fairytales with poison'.

Marekawaii ('Nightmare-cute') created as an alternative to Yamikawaii to avoid the copyright issues, and as a counterpart to Yumekawaii. Marekawaii is specifically defined as being open to your own interpretation and style.

Medikawaii ('Medical-cute') a pastel kawaii aesthetic focusing on only medical motifs, such as medicine and hospitals.

Gurokawaii ('Grotesque-cute') mixes frightening and disturbing imagery with kawaii. Kyary Pamyu Pamyu helped popularise it.

Iryouu Kei ('Medical Kei') a Visual Kei substyle with lots of gore and hospital theming, very OTT and theatrical, such as dressing like a nightmare nurse.

Living Doll artists see themselves and their bodies as a canvas to create art and express themselves, often with intricate make-up and body painting. This is a good one to look at if you're into heavy artistic makeup. **Kei CIUD**

Scorching, Houstonian sun shines through the windows of a quaint tearoom on a Saturday morning. The room is filled to the brim with a family of J-fashion lovers, from a woman in dark ouji browsing a rack of Sex Pot Revenge to another in fairy kei with eyes on a mannequin in a pink Liz Lisa dress. Someone wearing cult party kei laughs with a friend in gothic lolita across a tiered platter of mini sandwiches and vegan sweets. The room is full of joy, community, and pints of flavored tea. Two men, dressed in black, spikes, and platform shoes walk to the center of the room. The crowd quiets as they make their announcement: the Kickstarter is over 50% funded. The room lights up with cheers and applause as their dream gets one step closer to reality.

Kuroshiro Kawaii is a new J-fashion shop based out of Houston, TX. The owners, Kal and Collin, are two trans men who focus on providing access to quality Japanese Fashion while strengthening ties and creating a safe space for the Houston community. It's all about duality: the sweetness of pastels and frills vs the bitter of black and spikes, good and evil, order and chaos, kuro and shiro. They are an official retailer of Japanese brands like LIZ LISA, SEX POT ReVeNGe, and Metamorphose and have done collaborations with indie brands like Ota-Q and Puvithel, all before opening their physical store.





### Tell us a little about your personal styles and inspirations.

**Collin:** So, it's definitely changed. My style is very fluid. I initially started out as a lolita way back in the day, and then from there went into just flat out vampire aristocrat. That was in the glory days of Malice Mizer and all that. Then, for a long time I kind of was just like standard goth and would have some J fashion stuff on the side. It was not only a money thing but I didn't really know where my style was going. After a little while, I had a lapse of time where I kinda got out of the visual-kei scene. It was only for a couple of years, but then I kicked myself back into it. From there it's kind of crossed between like punk and Strega. A LOT of Strega inspiration on my side. I just completely stopped caring about what's supposed to go together. I mean, even when I was in lolita, I didn't care. I had the black version of Puppet Circus that I would wear with Jeffrey Campbell gold spiked heels and a Juicy Couture bag and jewelry. And everyone was like, "Well I don't know about that...those shoes!!" and I'd be like, "I don't give a shit what you think about the shoes".

**Kal:** My style inspiration is kind of a cross between Reita from the Gazette and Kamijo. I love the vampiric, styled intricacies of Versailles. Kamijo and his famous jackets. Everything kinda changed for me when we went to Japan! For a long time I was a plus size and wearing ouji. It's so hard to be a plus size ouji because there's nothing, but when I went to Japan I got a lot more into the Sex Pot punk style. When Onicon brought them, I got to meet and take pictures of everybody and I to wear brand. I was like, "Oh, this is so comfortable." And then when we were in Japan, we went to Closet Child so much that I suddenly had a new wardrobe, mostly Sex Pot.

Callie: Oh wow. That was big a jump!

**Kal:** From primarily ouji to, "Oh by the way, now I'm wearing J-fashion every day."

**Callie:** I remember you said something about how in Japan, people kind of don't give a fuck about the rules. They really

don't. Remember how when I first came to America and I was like, "I have to be matchy matchy"? That was totally me... ...trying to impress y'all, I'm not gonna lie. So now it makes me feel happy knowing that everyone kind of doesn't give a fuck.

Collin: So one of the things in lolita and J-fashion in general is, I've never been like "this is how we do it". Because when I was going to SCAD, my roommate had lived in Japan for nine years and was a lolita. She would pop on a Baby skirt with some sneakers and like a cool printed tee and be like, "Alright, let's go out". And it was so nice because it felt like I was finally justified in my ways. Reality is, it's a Japanese fashion but Western rules are so constricted. If you go to Japan, it's not like that at all. People wear lolita with sneakers. What else are you going to do, walk around in heels all day?

**Kal:** If you look at Tokyo fashion snap photos, everyone is wearing sneakers, and no one cares.

### What made you decide to open Kuroshiro Kawaii?

Collin: So I've always wanted to have a place to go hang out. I want a place where I can get Sex Pot. I want a place that I feel comfortable. I'm a guard dog. It's just naturally the way I am. Whenever we'd go out and there's a bunch of lolitas, I am going to make sure that you guys aren't heckled. Like, fucks sake, why can't you just have one day where you're just not bothered? So, I'll stop a bad interaction if I can. And I would love to be able to just hang out and not have to do that and not have to be the guard dog or like the dad, like "Are you taking pictures of my child? Cause I will rip that phone out of your hands."

There is an interaction in the Galleria Mall that I will never forget. I think it's one of the big key ones that made me kind of snap a little bit. My wife and I were just going to Origins and we're dressed up because we're almost always dressed up. It's almost everyday for us. So we're going up the escalator and this old man pulls out his...

...phone and just starts taking pictures of us. So I put my hand out and I'm like, "Excuse me, if you'd like a photo, I'd really appreciate if you ask." And he said, "I don't give a fuck what you would appreciate." It was an older gentleman and I was just like, "excuse you, like we're just trying to go shopping." And then we went into the Origins and he continued to then try and record us. Origins is all glass all the way around, so he was on the outside of the store taking pictures and recording us as we were just trying to mind our own business. At that point you can't do anything.

Callie: It's like when you look outside of the norm, suddenly you're not really human anymore to people. Suddenly you're allowed to be touched and you're just kind of a spectacle. A lot of people seem to forget that we're just people too. I still don't know how to address that issue. Like what are you supposed to do? Everyone gets a button that says "This is not a costume"?

**Collin:** Well that was a big thing for us at Thorn and Moon. We had our event at Thorn and Moon and we wanted to raise awareness of the fact that this isn't costume. This is a fashion. We talked about the different fashions and the people were able to come up and ask us questions after the initial fashion show. The response was really good!

**Kal:** I'm very much a make it happen kind of person, and that carries into pretty much everything that I do. So when he was like, "Hey, you want to do a store?" I was like, yeah, that'd be good, but we can't." He said "Why not?" And I was like. "Why not?? Okay, I guess we're doing this then, let's go." It's been a roller coaster, it's going fast.

Collin: It works really, well because we complete each other. I'm really good at talking, I'm really, good at networking? I like making friends. I'm an extreme extrovert, there's......not a minute of the day I would want to be alone. So I am really, good, at that. I took the knowledge I had, the contacts I already had, and the experiences I've had and was like, "Hey, let's let's do this thing." And he was like, "okay." He takes all of the technical parts of it that my brain just can't compute.

Kal: I'm a writer for an oil field, and I'm in the marketing department, and I have a bachelor's in English and a minor in business administration. In addition to my Clear K and Lightning Savage Photography. I So I have technical business knowledge. I know how to start a business and I know the accounting, bookkeeping, little places to go. I have so much experience on that side. He's very good at the bigger ideas like, "Hey why, why don't we do this?" And I'm like, "Okay, this is feasible" or I tell h m "We don't have the money for that, bro."

**Kit:** I feel like Kal and I are really similar, Callie and Collin have big ideas and we have to reign you back to what's actually possible.

**Collin:** At the same time like sometimes we have to pull them out and be like, "No, we have to take a chance".



# Can you tell us more about what you want the brick and mortar store to look like?

Kal: We're looking at this house in the Old Town Katy area and it has a lot of character in the floor plan. You walk in, there's like a living room. Then there's a little room over to the side that is a garage that was converted into a room. That would be the indie area. You go to this side, there's two rooms. One of these rooms would be the photography studio. The other room would be more along the lines of self care. Then we'd have the dressing rooms. There's a kitchen, there's a dining room, and then there's this door that goes to what we would use as a storage area. It's like half the house, so we could put an employees only sign on that one door and block off half the house.

Collin: What's even better is that there's actually a mother in law suite in the back of the house that Kal most likely would live in. And then there's even a secondary small apartment on the house. I like to help everyone, so we could have a shop employee rent that space for a very small amount of money, That way they could not only have a low cost apartment, but they would also help when I'm not there. And then we could actually keep our overhead down by doing "shop by appointments" and having appointment requests on the website. And you could set up an appointment like, "Hey, I want to come shopping" and if any of us are available, we just pick it up and go

"Okay, we'll be there".

**Kal:** In addition to this mother-in-law suite and the other apartment, it has this fantastic little backyard garden area with a covered patio and a garden. We could even put a giant fountain in the middle. We can make it cute and it would be perfect for photos and just be a great hangout area. We can have tea picnics, snow cone parties, and movie nights too.

Collin: The photo room is going to have a three month rotation. So every three months there'll be a completely new setup with a different style. We're actually partnering with an antique store and we're going to be getting some super cool things in the room. Then it's like if you see something in the room you love, you can actually purchase it. That way it's not only supporting the photo room itself, but it's also supporting another small business.

**Callie:** Would people pay to use the photo room?

**Kal:** Yes. So we have two options once we get the room. One option is if you don't want professional pictures you can just rent out the room to take pictures with your friends and bring your own cameras. If you want it a professional photographer there, me or a photo employee, you could pay a higher fee. They would do the editing and everything and give you your photos through email.



### What kind of events would you like to hold in your store?

**Kal:** We were thinking about having a like a cupcake or cookie making meet. If we get the house that we're trying to get, we will have the kitchen as part of the main shop.

Collin: That way if one of our guests wants some tea or something, we have that for them. You know, we're also going to be a registered LGBT safe space. I plan on having sodas, crackers, light snacks. If someone comes in and says "Hey, I just need to chill for a bit." Okay, sit down. That's fine. Take some time. Like what's going on? You're cool, right? Cool.

Collin: We're also thinking about doing something like a bi-annual swap meet. I know that we want to do meet and greets because we are friends with a lot of the designers. We would love to bring designers or like social media faces and hold meet and greet tea parties. Something more personal. That's one aspect that I'd like to take from Oni-con, is that you actually get to spend time with our guests.

### Any final statements?


Collin: No matter where you come from or who you've supported in the past, you are welcome. Anyone is welcome to come to our events and come to the store. It is a judgment free place and we want everyone to have a safe, fun environment where they don't have to worry. I think that's one of the biggest things for us and for for KSK is that safety.

I don't know if Melancholiaah necessarily has a "concept". Melancholiaah is just my mind put out on a stage, it's no concept really. Melancholiaah in it's most raw state is just my train of thought and all my trauma and experiences put in a performance form that's been with me forever, an idol state. I had been raised performing, because I did like it, and I do once again, but for a long while in my life every time I performed I felt nothing but darkness. I felt like I was naked on stage and the audience

was stabbing me over and over again, though that wasn't the case. After a bout of internet fame in 2008, it gave me a lot of good experiences, but a lot of trauma as well that led me to become who I am today for better or for worst. I was scared to perform for the longest time, would sob profusely after almost all of my performances for years but could never show that to anyone. No one was forcing me to do anything, but because of trauma and other illnesses, I felt ultimately trapped in this world that I put myself into and I didn't know how to get out, until I gained the strength...

...to perform as Melancholiaah that is. Therapy always did me well, medication was reliable, but I realized I needed to really get into myself and ask myself some important questions and Melancholiaah came to be the answer to those guestions. Melancholiaah is whatever I need it to be for me in the moment, a vent act, a revenge act, an empty vessel, my strength, whatever it may be. She is the epitome of a person's emotions going through waves, representing the very idea that it is up to us if we sink or swim, and though water gets in her lungs, she will always swim. Always. Melancholiaah is a way for me to present my most raw and authentic self in a way I can still perform, one that I am scared to present to everyone every day because I've realized I've been living a lie for a very long time. There's not really a concept, she's just my real self.

You put a lot of effort into your live shows like visuals and back vocals. What is the average process behind one show?

All of my live shows have storylines with them and that is where my planning begins. I need a theme for my shows, a moral lesson or a simple viewpoint on the world. It sounds bad, but I write my shows during relapses. Sometimes the relapses last one night, sometimes a few days, sometimes months. After a short amount of time, my brain starts turning a little bit and tells me to write everything out, it tells me I can turn this into something to grow stronger from. Getting to this point took a really long time, but I am so proud that I have been able to get to this point. After writing the meat and the bones to my shows, I usually feel a lot better and am able to write a bittersweet happy ending to my shows. Whatever I need to tell myself or remind myself at the time are what

Galaxy Dreams Photograph my shows are about and oftentimes they resonate with others as well, which I am so happy to have this sort of mutual healing with everyone through my performance. Stage visuals and backing tracks though can go anywhere from MONTHS in advance of planning all the way to two days before the event. On top of merchandise creation and restock, creating my stage shows, costuming, keeping up with my Patreon, things can get really hard especially since I want to keep things authentic and not sacrifice my point of view on things. I am only one person and I try to remind myself of that all the time, but I do like each of my shows to be a little unique to every new audience I perform for, so it's just a lot of stress. It doesn't necessarily sound healthy, but by the end of it I feel so so good.

You've created a lot of original songs. What advice do you have to music creators?

To be honest, the first single I released I am not an ounce proud of, but I just wanted to release something to put me on the charts. It thankfully worked and because of it's release, I have been able to grow into myself a little more comfortably and can release music that is...

...really meaningful to me. Explore, try to recreate sounds that move you and that represent you well. Don't make things you think people will like, make things you like. I promise there's someone out there with a mind like yours that will appreciate it. For my upcoming EP, I have had the chance to work with some like minded creators and know a lot of people are curious as to where and how I've found or started working with these producers. Please never be scared to reach out to anyone. Reach out to musicians you like! Overall, making original music can be extremely expensive but rewarding, so please budget well so you can see your end goal bloom.

It's very impressive to know you self-produce and edit your PVs. What's it like to create these music videos by yourself?

It's pretty easy actually. Unlike dance and vocals, I do have a film education under my belt which makes editing and other things a breeze! The hard part is that I am not a film studio, a crew, anything like that, so I have virtually no budget for PVs. One day I would really love to build a camera and rent out some nice lights and do something big, but then you have to look at so many other things to add on top of it. Who do I hire to do all the behind the scenes work when I have to be on screen?

In those terms, it's difficult, but

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ple as I have just running around places with a camera with my mom, it's no difficulty at all. I kind of like the at home thrown together look anyway, so it works well in my favor!

There have been many events and conventions you've performed at. What has been your most memorable event to this date?

Ikkicon 2018 really took me somewhere. At first, I was really sad I was performing last and would have less of an audience. The message in my show was really important to me and I was afraid it wouldn't hit as hard as I wanted, but I was beyond wrong. The audience was so strong and responsive, they gave me so much power and emotion back during that show from start to finish. There aren't a lot of instances I can say I felt the audiences' pains and passions as strongly as I feel my own while performing, but that time I really did. Sometimes I re-watch the performance and just watch the audience in awe.

You used to be a member of Beckii Cruel's original net-idol group, Oishii!Project! What is a net-idol group and was your time like in the group?

Actually, prior to Oishii!Project, Beckii and I were in another net idol group called the "Cruel Angels Project". It was a real, genuine production team, but don't let those fancy

words fool you because the founders were still kind of shady, which I am sure Beckii has lots more information on that than me, haha! Three of the girls of that net group were chosen to actually debut under a major label and I was told I was to debut! After buying a whole new wardrobe to go to Japan and debut with Beckii and another, I was told they changed their minds and I was too young, ten at the time. It was a major hit but little me was kind of the comeback queen, so when Oishii!Project came along after CAP's dissolution, I was of course going audition. A net idol group is usually consistent of someone doing normal idol activities all digitally.

Digital photo books...

...online covers both song and dance, a lot of opportunity to collab with other performers around the world, which is exactly what Oishii!Project was. Aside from this, I am sad to say I really don't remember my time in there as much. I remember clashing with people sometimes because I was about thirteen and didn't have a great microphone for our original recordings, but that's one of the only things I remember, haha! I also remember trying to be someone I wasn't while working with them. I did make really nice friendships there and am happy we have all grown into our own and all support each other now.

support each other now though I keep in touch with some more than others. It was a fun way to pass time and a good way to keep little me entertained during the summer.

Along with Oishii!Project, you are part of an overseas idol group called SHEあわせ (SHEawase). How was working in a group in person different from online net-idol work?

Yes! Although we are on a bit of a hiatus, working in person is a million times more rewarding, but that could also be because SHEawase is a group of some of my best friends. SHEawase use to be a Hello!Project cover group that I followed religiously growing up and then I met them accidentally one year working at a maid...


...cafe together. Since then it's been such a fun journey. Although it's more fun, there is a lot more room for tears and hardships as it feels so much more real. If one person messes up, everything has to stop until we can all get it right, so that was stressful considering I was usually the one messing up. But it also leads to grow much more real connections, something I am so glad to have made. Although I am much more suited as a solo act, SHEawase has given me much more than just performance experience, which I struggled to get from any of the net-projects I've been a part of.

.What advice do you want to give to anyone who wants to start their idol or musical journey?

Don't be anything but yourself. Don't focus on anyone but yourself. Put all your emotion into yourself. Put that hard work into your craft. Make something you're proud of. If you really want it, you have to go and grab it because no one is going to grab it for you. Also, don't take things too seriously and remember who you're doing this for, which should always be yourself. Find that goal, that message, anything, and perform for that. I think a lot of people lose themselves in the community or never really take off due to fear. As someone who kept performing even in that fear, please try to remember that dream that visits you each night and perform until that dream is a reality.

What is your end goal with Melancholiaah?

I think about the words "the end" a lot. Although I have only been performing as Melancholiaah for a little over a year now, I feel I have done so much, discovered so much. Some days I just sit and think, "what if my next show, I announce I am ending this after this year?". Although Melancholiaah gives me strength, I do know this is by no means what I want to do forever. I have been performing my entire life, one day I would really love to be in the middle of no where with a peaceful life where everyone has forgotten about me. The reason I can't do that is that I haven't reached my end goal. I can't say "the end" without hitting that goal, I can't allow myself. Melancholiaah exists to challenge my limits, to turn my discomfort into something I can grow with and turn into something beautiful, something I can proudly show and look back on. Melancholiaah is a way to document my healing. With each show I do it's one step towards reclaiming who I am, reclaiming what I remember I use to love so much. My end goal is simple. It is to one day be able to show who I really am to everyone proudly, it is to one daybe happy and comfortable in this tainted skin I feel I live in. When I look in the mirror, in my eyes I can see my true self and she is always very excited to perform for everyone, to show everyone that in destruction, only you can make beauty blossom in the aftermath. During a live event, she getsto perform and sing her heart out and take one



...I day dream about "the end", I don't know when that will truly be. Perhaps one performance, I will just feel it and say it.

You have an upcoming EP releasing this October, tell us more about it!

Yes I do! My EP is a concept EP focusing on what one would do when told their world is about to end. How they decide to spend their time, who they make those final memories with, the last dream they have, every song takes a look at a different aspect of that. As mentioned, my first single was really just something to get something out there, but this has a lot of heart in it. The music coming out of it is something real, something I will be proud of performing finally and that has been a goal during this process, to make music I would love to perform. I am beyond lucky to be working with the producers I am and to have the translation team working so hard too. I am so thankful for everyone working with me to make this a success, DJ Amaya, Creep-P, Kamikaze Bitch, Akira Complex, Phoebe of the idol group PhEri, EliOuji, my parents even, without their willingness to work with me on this I would be no where and I would have to chalk this up to being a challenge I've failed and to just continue moving on and working towards another. It's been really hard funding this all as one person, but I really like the stress of it and like fretting over all my deadlines and things. A convention I am guesting at in October, Wichita Falls Comic Expo, is even going out of their way to hold a release party for me, so I am beyond happy! The EP will be released on October 20th and will be both digital and physical. This is my first time mass printing CDs as my first physical release was all 100% handmade, so I am nervous but really excited! Things like this make me just really appreciative for everything and where I am now in life.

Thank you all so much for listening to me ramble on about things! I hope one day we can all meet and move each other with music and real emotion, make a real connection full of love, acceptance, and peace with one another and ourselves. Hello Kei Club! Today I have a bit of a 'vent piece' on menhera! \*ba-dum tsh\*

Ok but seriously, I've been feeling frustrated with some negative feedback.

Let's start at the beginning.

I'm creating a new menhera line, **Anxiety Angel**, centering around anxiety and intrusive thoughts, with a harsh 'hurt but survived' vibe, exemplified with a black base and bright line work. Sounds like a good, standard menhera print, right? Well...

This is a very personal piece for me. As a lucky owner of a PTSD, I'm gifted with a party of various **bRaIN** problems. With Anxiety Angel I've chosen to focus on my personal intrusive thoughts. Intrusive thoughts for myself, like for many others, sit in the background of my mind playing on repeat. An annoying buzz for sure, but muted, and mostly unintrusive \*ba-dum tsh\*. But what exactly is running through my head like a broken record?

I hate myself and I want to die .

and, I usually don't hate myself too much. But those quiet words are there, constantly bogging me down. So I took this phrase and repeated it - looping and cycling around a metaphorical 'anxiety angel'. I hoped this would impart the feeling of my nonstop background noise to viewers. I'm also venting "Look at what I live with! This is my existence."

But...



Many who've previewed this art dislike it. My printer (a relative of mine) expressed a great deal of reluctance in printing my shirts at all. Even some menhera have told me that it's just ... too much... for their personal tastes.

I admit I expected some push back but not this much. I remember the 'og' menhera prints by Nemutai, ankoROCK, etc., with nooses, razor blades, repeating text of 'death'...'suicide', and internally I lament.

It's not that I hate the sweeter styles popular in the west, but I feel like we're missing part of the point of menhera.

Menhera is expression and awareness about issues that are societally ignored and stigmatized. Positivity is important but it doesn't show the full picture, and the stark reality of some menhera topics is lost when we only allow sterilized messages. What happened to the "Pay affention!!" vibes the harsher original prints had?

We are not going to pretend everything is ok just to make you feel better. We exist!

#### Pay attention!

Maybe in the end I am just the old man (old man-hera? \*ba-dum tsh\*) shaking my cane at the new wave.

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It's too dark. It's too pessimistic. It's not a positive message.

It's not a happy thought. I don't like it either. But it's there. Always. Shouldn't we be allowed to express the negative?

Can't vent art actually vent?

Kimura is voice actor, illustrator, model and the designer behind beloved brands KawaiiHolic and KOKOkim. She has been appointed a Kawaii Ambassador by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Harajuku and travels the world sharing her love for all things cute! We were absolutely humbled to down with Kimura-san and talk about her experiences as a designer and get tht scoop onher newly announced brand and anime, Pista and Chio.

#### If the color pink didn't exist, what color would you wear the most?

What a sad, sad world to be in! Lavender, I guess!

#### Do you prefer modeling kawaii clothing or designing it?

I've been modeling for 12 years now, but I didn't have much confidence. I didn't really talk and I always compared myself to the other people. Like, "Oh, she's cuter than me". So I wanted to be cuter, cuter, cuter! I was always thinking that. And then about a year ago I finally started to think about designing because I wanted to do something on the creative side. Then, I actually had more confidence because that was my own work. This question really made me think, "Hmm, which one?". It's hard to pick which one is better because I like both now.

### We are huge fans of your designs for the idol group, Wasuta! What was your favorite costume to design?

Even from the beginning it was always very relaxed. They would tell me to do whatever design I'd like! They want to see that. I think at first it was more difficult, but I've gotten a lot better at following my heart's compass and finding the thing I think is the cutest. Especially in the last year or so, I've gotten better at following "the radar". "Beep beepbeep beeep!"



I feel like the things I've designed most recently better match my true idea of what is cute. My more recent designs are my favorite because they're more true to me.

For Wasuta it was like, "follow your heart, whatever you want to design." So it was really cool compared to the previous company.


Much more relaxed.

made it? It's crazy!" There's a one artist in Japan named Kobayashi Sachiko. At the end of the year they have a big music festival and

she always brings a crazy costume. On the stage it's like "Can she even move?" It really gives a big impact. People actually anticipate it and go, "Oh, what's she's going to do to this year?" I really want to do something crazy that you haven't seen yet.



Kami-sama! I would want to do gods from different cultures, like if there were five members of the group they would each represent a different god from a different culture. Very crazy, over the top designs!





Tell us more about your new clothing brand, Pista and Chio.

So like 10 years ago I was at Japan Expo and got the idea for Pista and Chio. I tried to make the story back then, but the producers kept making me do revisions. I had to change it four times. The third time I had to change it, I was really down because it made me think "Oh, I can't make it, it'll never work." This Pista and Chio is the final script I made.

I started setting milestones, like one year, five years, 10 years, 35 years. There's a saying in Japan that if you can't make anything in 35 years, you are trash. So, the brand will have changed over

35 years. When I first had the idea, I had to think about those 35 years and got scared of what would happen if I couldn't make it. So the setting of Pista and Chio is set 35 years in the future and connected to my feelings about that concept.

It's interesting seeing how much Pista and Chio is connected to your personal life and experiences. Will you be appearing as yourself in the anime as well?

The character "U" is coming up, and Chio is actually her daughter. I won't be the only special appearance, either! It's parallel world so I'm using people who already exist.



#### What can we expect from the P and C clothing brand in the future?

I actually had some yukatas made, but they arrived one day too late to be sold at Okashicon. There are photos on my Instagram right now if you'd like to see them!

#### What has been your favorite part of making the anime and the manga?

Callie, as a fellow creative, you understand how I want to do so many different things. I'm following my heart "radar" right now. If I want to do it, I do it. Right now, I'm just really enjoying everything about creating the anime.



#### Do you have any advice for someone who wants to do kawaii fashion design?

I know I've been saying it a lot but that heart radar is very, very important! Not just knowing the things that you like, but also the things that you hate as well. Knowing both of those is really important to being able to fully discover what it is that you are most drawn to doing and what you feel most called to doing. That's not only for designers, that's for everyone.
